

# From Here On

A new piece of physical theatre about being forced to find a new home.

The show is performed by young people and adults from different part of the world coming together.





The show is performed outdoors; on beaches and in public places.



It tells the story of 5 different children who have all sought sanctuary in the UK, from the Kindertransport in 1945 until today.

These 5 stories are:



Lily: a girl who loved music before the war and then was sent by her parents with her violin to the UK as part of the Kindertransport.





Salvador: a boy who was a child soldier in El Salvador and then came to the UK. He has a passion for music.



Nadia: a girl who arrived in the UK from Ukraine after the invasion of Russia. She loves dancing, she always finds freedom through dance.



Raza: a girl from Syria, who finds support through a foster family in the UK while she searches for reconnection with her Syrian culture.





Arman: a boy who has a strong connection with his family and his ancestors. He came to the UK from Burundi. He has a passion for writing and is sometimes played by a girl or a boy.

# What happens in the show



A person walking into the space, carrying a journal.



The performers go into the space, they welcome everyone.



There are 5 main characters, each of them and their stories, are introduced to us throughout different sections, on the platforms and on stage.

The stories happen in the following order: Nadia, Salvador, Arman, Raza, Lily.



These 5 stories end with the Kindertransport scene: We see the characters journey to the UK.



We see the Kindertransport children arrive and be welcomed by everyone.



The 5 main characters meet at the end and share their experiences.





All performers join at the end for the final section and dance altogether.


